

It will also allow them to understand and explore how Leeds has changed over time, focussing particularly on Victorian Leeds. We will also delve into the history of artists of Leeds and who created famous pieces of art right on our doorsteps! Let's step back in time together to explore Victorian Leeds!

Describe changes that have happened in the locality of the school throughout history. · Place events, artefacts and historical figures on a time line using dates. · Understand the concept of change over time, representing this, along with evidence, on a time line. · Use dates and terms to describe events. · Use appropriate historical vocabulary to communicate, including: · dates · time period · change · Use literacy, numeracy and computing skills to a good standard in order to communicate information about the past. · Shape and stitch materials. · Use basic cross stitch and back stitch. · Colour fabric. · Create weavings. · Quilt, pad and gather fabric. Replicate some of the techniques used by notable artists, artisans and designers. · Create original pieces that are influenced by studies of others.

Title: In Victorian Leeds

<u>Curriculum Driver: History,</u> <u>Geography and Art</u>

Topic Outcome

To understand how Leeds has changed over time.
To understand how life was different in Victorian times.
To understand the passing of time.

<u>Coverage</u>

History - Who were the Victorians? Who was Queen Victoria? When did she rule? What was life like in the Victorian times? Research Queen Victoria on the chromebooks and write produce a fact file about Queen Victoria. When and what was the Industrial Revolution? Research the inventions that were significant of the period. Do we still use these inventions today? How have they shaped the past? Produce a timeline of the key dates and inventions of the period. Look at the Victorian schools. How are they different from today? Compare and contrast the similarities and differences. What was crime and punishment like in Victorian times? Produce an informative piece of writing about this period.

Geography - Look at the lives children in Victorian Leeds had and how it is different from ours today. Use photographs, and stories from the past to compare it to our lives now. Look into important / famous people during the victorian era and why they were important to the times. How has Leeds changed over time and why? Could you live in Victorian Leeds today? Why would it be hard? Would school be the same? Why /not?
