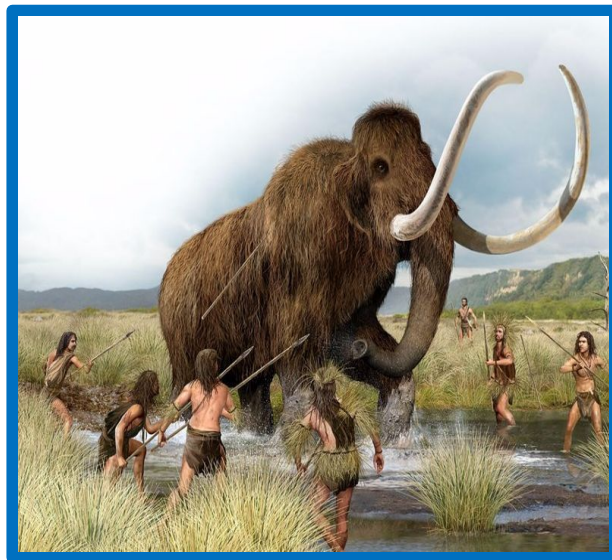

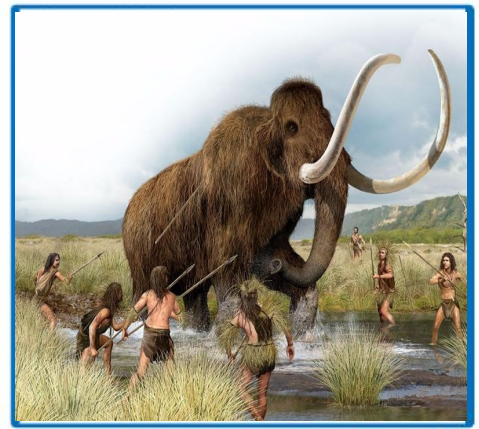

Key Curriculum Driver: History

Other Curriculum Areas: Science

Rationale: In the Stone Age will provide the opportunity for children to explore the time of the Stone Age. The children will explore the important events in British history from the Stone Age through to modern Britain. They will also explore key dates from the Stone Age through to the Bronze Age. They will investigate what life was like in the Stone Age time such as religion, art and homes. This topic will also give children the opportunity to investigate rocks and soils as part of their science learning. Children will be able to investigate using practical resources in school.

By the end of this topic, most children will have:

Have an excellent knowledge and understanding of people, events, and contexts from this period.

- The ability to think critically about history and communicate ideas confidently.
- The ability to consistently support, evaluate and challenge their own and others' views using detailed, appropriate and accurate historical evidence derived from a range of sources.
- The ability to think, reflect, debate, discuss and evaluate the past, formulating and refining questions and lines of enquiry.
- A passion for history and an enthusiastic engagement in learning, which develops their sense of curiosity about the past and their understanding of how and why people interpret the past in different ways.
- A respect for historical evidence and the ability to make robust and critical use of it to support their explanations and judgments.
- A desire to embrace challenging activities, including opportunities to undertake high-quality research across a history topic.

Topic Hook

- Stone Age cave paintings

Title: In the Stone Age

Curriculum Driver: History and Science.

History Coverage

- Begin topic with a knowledge harvest. What do you already know about the Stone Age? What would you like to find out?
- Look at key events from British history. Can we place chronologically on a timeline? Look at key events from the Stone Age to the Bronze Age. Can we place key dates chronologically on a timeline?
- Explore what life was like in the Stone Age. How did they live? Where did they live? What were their houses like? What kind of food did they eat? Why? Investigate gatherers and hunters and what this meant.
- Look at settlements in the Stone Age. Use the chromebooks to investigate Skara Brae and Stone Henge. Investigate the significance of these places to the people of the Stone Age era.
- In Science, investigate rocks and soils. What are the different kinds of rocks? Explore and investigate where these rocks can be found and the differences between them.
- Research how fossils are formed and the fossilization process.
- Investigate the different soil formations.

- Information leaflet about Stone Henge.
- Comic strip about UG.

Extended Writing Genres and Activities

Information fact file about different types of rocks identifying sedimentary, igneous and metamorphic rocks.

Trips and Experiences

Fossil workshop via a zoom call.

Other subject Coverage

- Art - Cave paintings using different mediums such as berries, chalk etc
- History and Art - Research Stone Henge and produce a fact file. Produce a pastel artwork of Stone Henge
- Music - Ukuleles every Tuesday
